

**Rabbi Julie K. Gordon Received Doctor of Divinity at
HUC-JIR Graduation Ceremony in New York**



Rabbi Julie K. Gordon, Principal of **George Kaplan Afternoon School and Midrasha** and Director of **Talmud Torah/Mount Zion Hebrew Program**, received a Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa*, from the **Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR)**. The degree was granted at HUC-JIR's New York Graduation ceremony on Thursday, April 30, 2009 at Congregation Emanu-El of the City of New York.

Rabbi David Ellenson, Ph.D., announced HUC-JIR alumni recipients who were awarded honorary Doctorates of Divinity, Music, Jewish Religious Education, and Jewish Communal Service, as well as the Founders' Medallion, in recognition of their 25 years of distinguished professional service.

Rabbi Ellenson said, "Rabbi Gordon's devotion to strengthening people's connections to God, Torah, and the Jewish people has been the hallmark of her career. As Chaplain in the Minneapolis Veteran's Hospital for two decades, Rabbi Gordon is a compassionate counselor to those who served our country."

Rabbi Gordon has served the Twin Cities Jewish community in a variety of leadership roles. She was the rabbi at Temple of Aaron in St. Paul, MN. Previously she served Conservative congregations in Green Bay, WI and Brooklyn, NY for a total of 17 years in congregational leadership. Rabbi Gordon was the Spiritual Life Director at the Minneapolis Jewish Day School. She directed Avodah B'Yachad, Service Together, renamed Justice Squared at JCRC. Rabbi Gordon taught as adjunct faculty at the College of St. Catherine.
