

Amy Dover Neistein to Receive Doctor of Jewish Communal Service at HUC-JIR Graduation Ceremony in Los Angeles

Amy Dover Neistein, Associate Director, Israel and Overseas Services at the **Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Detroit**, will receive a Doctor of Jewish Communal Service, *honoris causa*, from the **Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR)**. The degree will be granted at HUC-JIR's Los Angeles Graduation ceremony on Monday, May 18, 2009. HUC-JIR is the nation's oldest institution of higher Jewish education and the academic, spiritual, and professional leadership development center of Reform Judaism.

Rabbi Ellenson said, "Amy Dover Neistein's experiences as a child of the deep South, on the staff of the Henry S. Jacobs Camp in Mississippi, and her first trip to Israel, have directed the course of her life. She has coordinated teen missions and a family mission to Israel, bringing her enthusiasm and love of the land and people to her local community."
