

Rabbi Jody Ruth Cohen to Receive Doctor of Divinity at HUC-JIR Graduation Ceremony in New York

Rabbi Jody Ruth Cohen, Rabbi at **Temple Israel of Greater Miami**, will receive a Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa*, from the **Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR)**. The degree will be granted at HUC-JIR's New York Graduation ceremony on Thursday, April 30, 2009 at Congregation Emanu-El of the City of New York.

Rabbi David Ellenson, Ph.D., announced HUC-JIR alumni recipients who will be awarded honorary Doctorates of Divinity, Music, Jewish Religious Education, and Jewish Communal Service, as well as the Founders' Medallion, in recognition of their 25 years of distinguished professional service.

Rabbi Ellenson said, "Rabbi Cohen's new initiatives at Temple Israel of Greater Miami have been met with enthusiastic support from her congregants. Early in her career as rabbi and educator, she established Noah's Ark, the first synagogue-run early childcare center in the country for infants and toddlers. She continues to earn the respect of her colleagues with her many honors, awards, and positions of leadership in Jewish and civic organizations."

Prior to becoming senior rabbi at Temple Israel, Rabbi Cohen served from 1997-2007 as the Regional Director for the Southeast Council of the Union for Reform Judaism. Rabbi Cohen also served as the solo rabbi of Temple Beth Hillel in South Windsor, Connecticut and associate rabbi of Congregation Beth Israel in West Hartford, Connecticut. She has lived on a kibbutz in Israel, led numerous trips to Israel, been active in outreach to intermarried families and served as an emissary of the Reform Movement to Argentina and the former Soviet Union. In 1985 Rabbi Cohen established Noah's Ark, the first synagogue run early childcare center in the country for children ages six weeks to five years.

A charter member of the Connecticut Women's Hall of Fame, Rabbi Cohen served as co-president of the Women's Rabbinic Network and an officer of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. She was ordained at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York in 1984 and received her B.A. degree from Mt. Holyoke College.
